


# Giving back to our veterans

#### • Travel-size toiletries for personal care kits.

Cleaning supplies for the cleaning buckets we send to flood victims in the South. These include:

-Air freshener: one can aerosol or pump

-Clothesline: one 100foot or two 50-foot lines (cotton or plastic)

—**Dish soap:** one 16- to 28-ounce bottle

- —Clothespins
- -Dishwashing gloves
- -Dust masks
- -Handi-wipes or reusable wipes: No terry cleaning towels
- -Insect repellant spray: 6- to 14-ounce aerosol or spray pump with protective cover

#### -Liquid household cleaner:

one 12- to 16-ounce bottle of concentrated liquid

cleaner that can be mixed with

-Liquid laundry

detergent: one 50-ounce or two 25-ounce bottles

-Scouring pads: Non-stainless steel (Brillo or SOS pads); nothing with built-in

-Scrub brush: plastic or wooden handle (no toilet brushes)

-Sponges: Only noncellulose sponges due to mold

> -Trash bags, heavy duty: 33- to 45-gallon size, at least 2-mm thick

Work gloves: cotton with leather palms or all leather

We were short of volunteers and had a full schedule of new guests and those returning to pick up furniture. Not to worry—God had our backs, and we had a day that flowed just perfectly.

Several guests rescheduled appropriately so that there was only one guest every half hour. Bunny filled the shelves with donated kitchenware and assembled cleaning bags; Karen R. worked with me to pack selected items and label furniture for guests; and Nina welcomed guests, answered the phone, and entered all data for the day. We also had several men available to help shift and load furniture.

Five new guests kept their appointments, and three guests picked up the furniture they had selected on their first visit. After weeks of running short of furniture and other items, the most amazing thing happened—all the new guests found everything they needed. We were ecstatic! Additionally, Chris Potter-Jones stopped in with some towels and dish sets she picked up at the thrift store to donate; Tom and Anne Henshaw stopped by with some pots and pans and 10 new no-sew quilts for our guests; another member of Wesley stopped in with piles of linens and blankets/comforters, many of which were brand new; and then Shelly Goldberg stopped by with extra kitchen supplies donated to Project You Are Love.
